Debby Rahmalia is an illustrator and storyteller based in Indonesia. She graduated from Bandung Institute of Technology, where she earned a

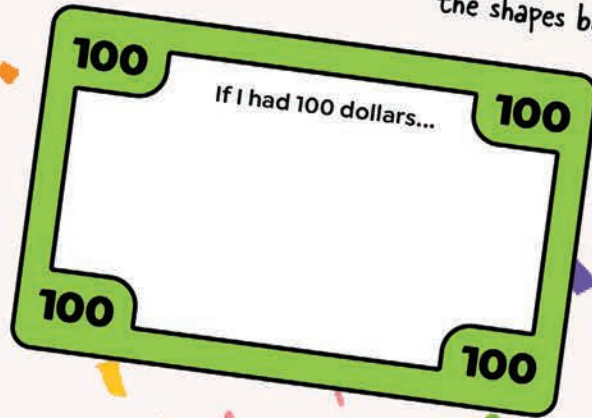

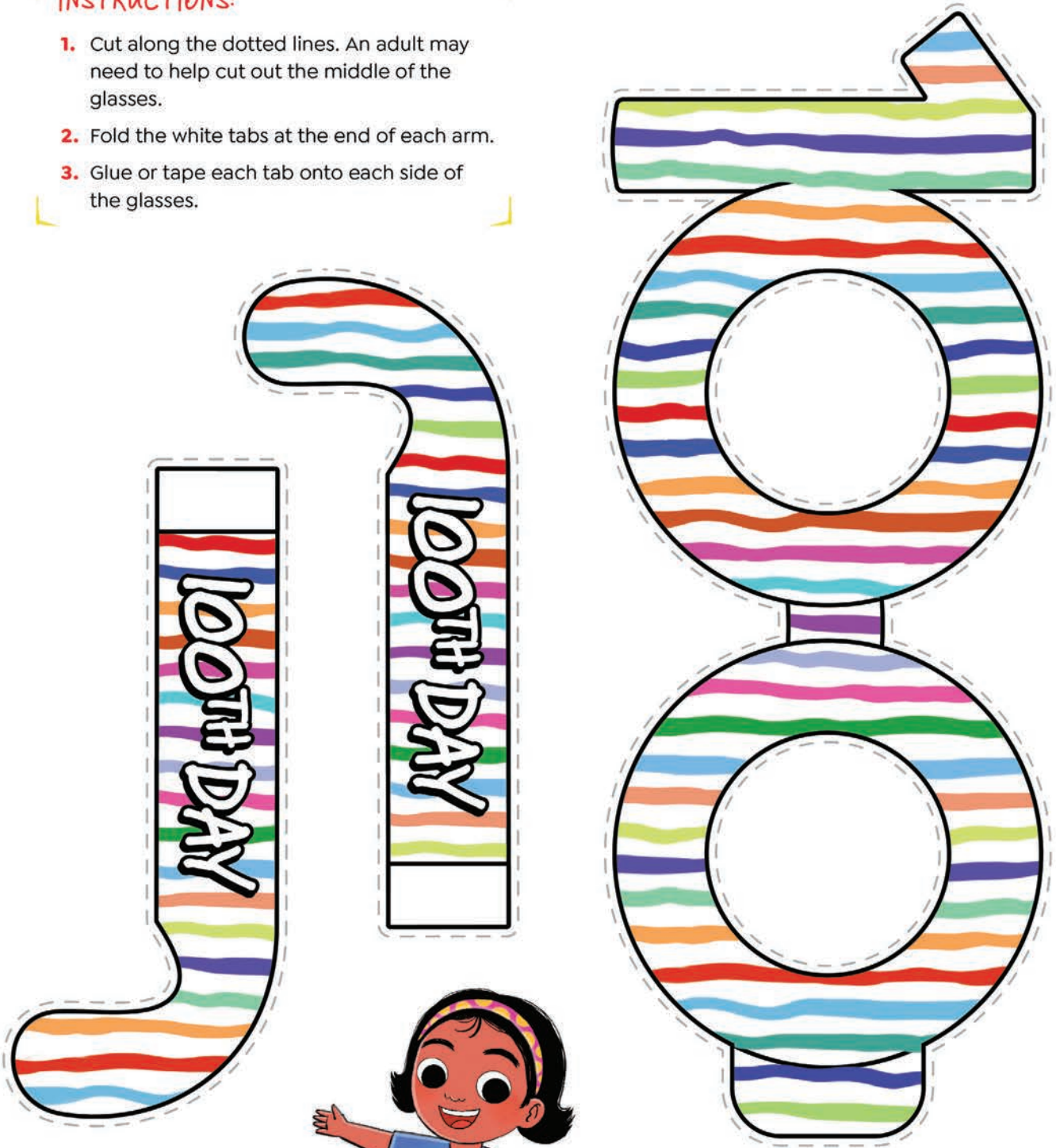

Help Ali get ready for the 100th Day of School parade by **drawing 100 gumballs on his hat.**

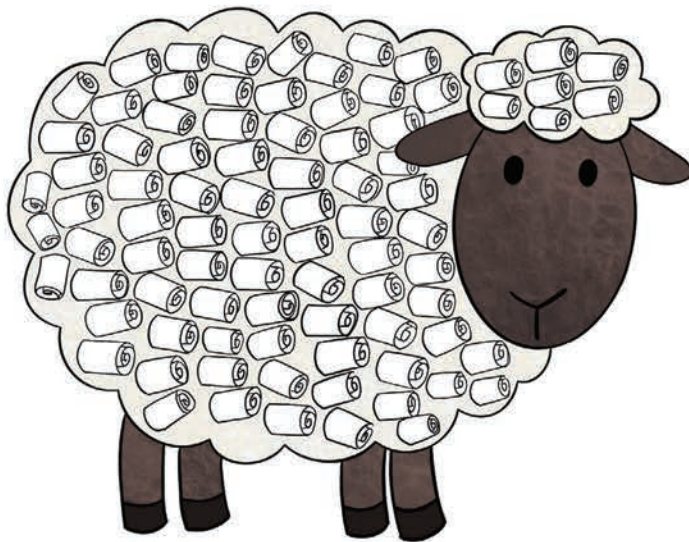


MAKE A QUILLED SHEEP

Sheep are a popular symbol for Eid al-Adha.

WHAT YOU NEED:

- 2 to 3 pieces of white cardstock or loose-leaf paper
- black marker or crayon
- scissors
- pencil
- glue



WHAT YOU DO:

1. On one sheet of paper, use the black crayon or marker to draw a sheep. Include a face, ears, and four legs.
2. Turn the second sheet of paper so that the long side is at the bottom. From the bottom to the top, cut the paper into narrow strips, each about a half inch, or 2 centimeters, wide.
3. Roll each strip of paper tightly around the pencil, then slide the rolled strip off the end of the pencil. (It's okay if it uncurls a bit.) This is called paper quilling.
4. Put a dab of glue on one side of the paper roll and glue it to the sheep's body.
5. Continue cutting, rolling, and gluing paper strips until the sheep is covered in curly "wool." Don't forget to add some curls to the top of its head!

JUNETEENTH CONFETTI POPPER

WHAT YOU NEED:

- Empty toilet paper roll
- Red, white, and blue paints
- Small paintbrush
- Small or medium red, white, or blue balloon
- Scissors
- Tape
- Tissue paper or construction paper



WHAT YOU DO:

1. Paint the toilet paper roll red, white, blue, or a combination of colors.
2. Tie a knot in the stem of the balloon. Cut off the other tip of the balloon.
3. Once paint is dry, stretch the cut end of the balloon over one end of the cardboard tube. Secure it with tape.
4. Finish decorating your popper by writing Juneteenth! on it or adding a star like the one on the Juneteenth flag.
5. Cut 1 to 2 sheets of tissue or construction paper into lots of tiny pieces to make confetti and place it inside the tube. Be careful to keep the tube upright or the confetti will spill out!
6. When you're ready to celebrate, pull the balloon down, then let it go and shout "Happy Juneteenth!" as your confetti flies!
